

Library or Bookstore?

In the United States, library (*biblioteca*) is the place where you can borrow books, magazines, compact discs, and even DVDs – free of charge – for a limited period of time. At the end of the loan period, you must return the borrowed items and thus continue to borrow more materials. A bookstore (*libreria*), on the other hand, is a store where you can buy the books and magazines. Here we talk about the public library.

The public library offers materials, programs, and services free of charge. For example:

- books, magazines, compact discs, videos, and DVDs
- Computers with Internet access
- Children's storytime
- Family programs
- Reference services

Library staff is here to serve and help you find what you need. Just ask for the librarian.

No computer at home? Use the public access computers in the library ♦

You can use the computers in the library to check your email, research over the Internet, complete school assignments, write letters, fill out online forms, make immigration appointments using INFOPASS and much more.

The library is for the whole family ♦

The entire family is welcome to library events. We have programs for children such as storytimes and summer reading. We also have programs for teenagers and adults.

It is easy to get a library card ♦

The library card is free. With your card you can borrow materials out of the library and enjoy them at home. To get the card, you must bring a current picture identification that shows your home address. If your ID does not show your current address, bring your electricity, gas, or water bill, or another document that shows your name and current address.

Do you have children?

If you would like to get a library card for your children under 18 years of age, a parent or legal guardian must assume responsibility for items checked out on their minor's card.



How to use your library card ♦

To borrow materials from the library, all you have to do is make your selections and present your library card at the check out desk.

Each library has their own circulation policies and the loan periods vary for books, videos and DVDs. At check out you'll get a note or receipt with the due dates.

It is very important that return the items on time. If your borrowed items become overdue, you will have to pay a small late fee. Of course, if the materials are returned on time, the library will not charge you.

Please, return your borrowed items on time so that other families may enjoy them as well.

Great treasures await you at the library – There, you will be able to advance your studies, enhance your quality of life and find endless hours of entertainment and enjoyment.

Ask your librarian for the books, magazines, music or videos, as well as programs and services that you want and need.

Remember. The public library is your library and its primary objective is to provide you with the information you need.
