2018 LSTA Competitive Round

Utah State Library will be hosting a competitive grant round of Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funding to be spent this year! These funds, totaling \$250,000, are available for public, school, academic, institutional, special, tribal, private

and research libraries including library
consortia. This year,
USL staff is asking
for a letter of intent



and a risk management survey to be completed prior to the application to assess eligibility and allow applicants a vehicle to think through their projects before the application opens. Libraries with approved letters of intent will be invited to submit a completed grant application. Letters of intent are due on February 1, 2018.

Note: there are several trainings available to assist you with each step, including writing letters of intent. Further information is available in this newsletter or library.utah.gov/workshops.



Stacy Vincent, Library Consultant for Technology & Innovation

Rachel Cook, Grants Coordinator

How did you become interested in the library field? It was an accident. I saw the posting for Grants Coordinator and it was something I was familiar with from the Arts, so I applied. It's just a happy coincidence I'm in libraries.

On a typical week, what do you do as the Grants Coordinator? Everything varies based on the time of year and where we are in the grants cycle.

Database Highlight:

Newspapers

Utah's Online Library provides access to several <u>Utah newspaper databases</u> that are all free to access with your library card. Here is a quick rundown of what is available:

Utah Newspapers

contains all Utah newspapers from 2004 to the present, including



local municipal papers. The search function is a bit clunky, but once you get past that you are rewarded with beautiful full-text, full-color pages.

Newspaper Source Plus

is an EBSCO database that contains millions of full-text articles from



thousands of newspapers worldwide. Some example titles include *Salt Lake Tribune*, *USA Today*, and *The Washington Post*.

Google News

provides full-text access to thousands of historical newspapers.



There is also a direct link from Utah's Online Library to Google News' repository of full-text Deseret News issues all the way back to 1830.

Proquest Newsstand

provides searchable access to 600 newspapers worldwide, and full text



access to 300. Some example titles include *The Salt Lake Tribune, Deseret News*, and *Wall Street Journal*. Direct links to the most popular titles are included under the <u>Utah's Newspaper Portal</u>.

Regional Business News

contains full-text access to a wide variety of regional and special



interest newspapers. You can find everything from African Banker to Wisconsin Law Journal.

Utah Digital Newspapers

is a University of Utah project to digitize historical Utah



Newspapers. This is a great place to look for obscure Utah municipal and historical newspapers, as well as more well-known titles such as *Deseret News*.

Say Yes to the Marquess



Introducing eBooks with ILL

Is Amazon Kindle eBook the only format available for a title your patron requested? Our new eReaders-Raspberry, Blueberry, Lime, Bluebell, Violet, Fuchsia, and Red Poppy- to the rescue!

The Utah State Library (USL) has purchased 4 Kindle Paperwhite eReaders and 3 Kindle Fire tablets for fulfilling eBook requests through the Inter-Library Loan (ILL) program. When we receive an ILL request for books

only available as a Kindle eBook, we will check with the requesting library and see if the patron is willing to check out an eReader to access the title. If the library and user agrees, then we will ship the Kindle with the title preloaded for use.



The Kindle will be secured from purchasing additional content; however, all titles already loaded on the device will be accessible. Wifi internet connection will also be disabled.

Check-out time is 4 weeks. One week after the due date the Kindle will be deactivated if not returned. The devices will be mailed in a case with the charging cable and instructions included. If the Kindle is damaged or lost, the library will be billed for the replacement cost of the device.
