Late last year the State Library finalized a contract with Creativebug, an online learning platform focusing on arts and crafts. The online video courses are neatly packaged into "chapters" hat allow you to proceed through a course at our own pace. You will find courses on quilting, ewelry making, sketching, oil painting, soap making, crochet and so much more! With the help of skilled instructors, you can take on an ambitious, long-term project or organize a simple "craft-of-the-day" schedule to keep the kids busy during the summer. While Creativebug is a database, it can be used as a programming tool as well. There will be no licensing violations if your library has a class and puts the videos on a projector.


Online Book Discussion


Overwhelmed, Caroline returns to her favorite place: the local sewing shop.


